## **Jurassic Scouts Program Overview**

### **WHAT IS IT?**

The Jurassic Scouts Camp Experience 2020 allows Scout units the chance to get out to enjoy nature at one of the Lincoln Heritage Council Scout Reservations and experience a great overnight campout or a simple day adventure. Packs, Troops, and Crews can participate in our volunteer-run program activities at one of our premier camping facilities: Harry S. Frazier Jr. Scout Reservation (Shepherdsville, Kentucky), Pfeffer Scout Reservation (Benton, Kentucky) or Tunnel Mill Scout Reservation (Charlestown, Indiana). Your Scouts will be sure to have a memorable Scout outing this fall.

### **FUN ACTIVITIES**

Program opportunities at the camps are abundant and many times do not require any special equipment. At the Jurassic Scouts Camp Experience, we have planned a weekend full of fun activities. Activities may include:

## Order Cub Adventure Boxes and bring them to camp!

The Lincoln Heritage Council is excited to launch Cub Scout Adventure Boxes. Each rank (Tiger, Wolf, Bear and Webelos/Arrow of Light) will have a specific box that is filled with nearly everything you need to complete five elective Cub Scout Adventures at home and jump start your Scout's advancement to the next rank this summer.

Within each box, you will find a copy of the Scout Oath and Law, and other assorted items which will help you to complete the adventure requirements at home as a family. Items may include craft kits, magic sets, and other small science equipment.

Each box also comes with activity specific written and video instructions so you can easily participate with your child. ## For Scouts BSA:

### Hikes

Two hikes will be offered: a 5-mile hike and a 10-mile hike. The 5-mile hike will be a morning event; it will start immediately after the opening ceremony and will end around noon or a little after. The 5-mile hike is focused on satisfying Second Class requirement 3(b). Trail maps will be provided. Leaders will instruct Scouts on how to use a basic trail map and compass together to stay on course, particularly at key intersections.

The 10-mile hike will be an all-day event. It will follow the Seven Arrows Trail from start to finish. The Seven Arrows is our premier trail, the longest trail on any Lincoln Heritage Council property. The hike will start immediately after the opening ceremony. Food will not be provided for you – you must bring your own lunch and trail snacks.

All hikers should dress for the weather, bring rain gear, trail snacks, and plenty of water. In addition, a compass and personal first aid kit is recommended.

### Mountain Biking

The mountain bike course starts in Camp Lowe at the first shed on your right as you drive back toward the Brotherhood Lodge. No reservations are required. The course will be open for the morning session and the afternoon session. Any mountain bikers who want to bring their own bikes (and/or helmets) are welcome to do so.

## Shooting Sports

Rifle and shot gun shooting will be offered both in the morning session and in the afternoon session. No reservations are required. Each scout will be allowed a certain number of shots, as determined by the Range Master on duty. Scouts who want to shoot more may get in the back of the line when their turn is done.

## Rank Advancement

In the afternoon, we will offer a scoutcraft program designed for young scouts who want to work on rank advancement. We will come prepared to teach many of the skills from Scout up through First Class and try to tailor the program to the needs of the scouts who participate –working on whatever requirements they need that we are prepared to teach.

## Overnight Camping Arrangements

### **TENT/ADIRONDACK CAMPING**

**\$20 discount fee / \$25 late fee**

A Scout unit of 50 people or less can reserve one of the camp's regular tent camping sites. Sites include water access, a picnic table, and access to a pit latrine. No electricity is available in the campsites. A permanent pavilion is available in some sites. Each group will be assigned a specific room (or rooms depending on group size) in the shower house which includes a flush toilet and shower. Groups will need to bring their own tents. A list of recommended equipment can be found on page 8.

An Adirondack is a three-sided, open-front cabin (with a curtain) that has bunk beds in it for up to 4 people due to physical distancing requirements. These are only available at Camp Crooked Creek and Pfeffer Scout Reservation. A limited number of campsites have these available and access to a permanent pavilion will be

possible. Sites include water access, a picnic table, and access to a pit latrine. No electricity is available in the campsites. A permanent pavilion is available in some sites. Each group will be assigned a specific room (or rooms depending on group size) in the shower house which includes a flush toilet and shower.

Don't feel like staying overnight? Come out for just the day! All the same activities are available including a S'mores kit if you choose to stay a little later for a campfire and stargazing. Day permits are required.

## Camp Policies and Procedures

Anyone participating in this event will be expected to follow BSA National Guidelines as outlined in the Guide to Safe Scouting

**COVID-19:** All participants must follow the CDC, Lincoln Heritage Council, and State/Local guidelines. We understand these guidelines may change frequently. We will continue to monitor all regulations and guidelines keeping the safety of our Scouts and families as our top priority.

**The Law is the Rule:** Everyone is expected to abide by the Cub Scout Promise, Cub Scout Law, Cub Scout Motto, Scout Law, Scout Oath, Scout Slogan, and the Venturing Code.

**Alcoholic Beverages and Illegal Drugs:** These will not be tolerated and are against BSA policy. Possession or use will result in immediate dismissal from camp.

**Buddy System:** Everyone will use the Buddy System (pairs) for safety. Adults/ Leaders should be notified before Scouts leave his/her campsite.

**Camp Emergencies:** In the case of a weather emergency, campers should seek protective shelter in a building or the assigned shower house for your campsite. Once the weather emergency has passed, campers should report to his/her campsites.

***The following emergency signals will be used:***

- Fire Alarm: Sound the siren (two long blasts)
- Weather Emergency: Sound the siren (one long blast)
- All Clear: Sound the siren (four long blasts)

**Camp Security:** All visitors to the camp must stop at the camp office and sign in. Upon conclusion of their visit, guests will also sign out so that camp administration will know who is on camp property at all times.

**Campsites:** Do not cut trees. Bring your own firewood, charcoal, or collect dead wood from downed trees. No pit/trench fires; use the fire rings provided. Never leave a campfire unattended; especially when going to bed. *All campfires should be extinguished according to BSA guidelines.* Please make sure before leaving that your campsite is completely cleaned up and all campfires are completely extinguished.

**Camping (follow BSA guidelines for camping):**

- Camp at your own risk
- Remember tent stakes and tie downs
- Closed toed shoes should always be worn
- Do not ditch or trench your tent

**Cleanup:** Practice Leave No Trace as best as you can. When ready to leave camp, we ask that you please clean up your area and leave it the same or better than you found it. Please take everything with you. Trash should be dropped in the dumpster as you leave camp.

**First Aid:** There will NOT be a Health officer on site. Medical emergencies should be reported to the campmaster or camp ranger if possible. Phone service is limited in camp and may require someone to travel up the road to call 911. Minor first aid should be handled at the campsite so bring a first aid kit.

**Knives, Hatchets, Axes, Chainsaws or Firearms:** No firearms are permitted at camp. No chainsaws are permitted. Axes and Bow Saws should only be used under strict adult supervision.

**Parking:** Park in designated parking areas only. Unit leaders need to help enforce this policy. We need to help preserve camp.

**Pets:** No pets will be allowed with unit camping trips.

**Smoking:** An important way adult leaders can model healthy living is by following the policies on alcohol, tobacco, and drugs. Leaders should support the attitude that they, as well as youths, are better off without tobacco in any form and may not allow the use of tobacco products at any BSA activity involving youth participants. This includes the use of electronic cigarettes, personal vaporizers, or electronic nicotine delivery systems that simulate tobacco smoking.

All Scouting functions, meetings, and activities should be conducted on a smoke-free basis, with smoking areas located away from all participants.

As outlined in the Scouter Code of Conduct, Scouting activities are not a place to possess, distribute, transport, consume, or use any of the following items prohibited by law or in violation of any Scouting rules, regulations, and policies: alcoholic beverages or controlled substances, including marijuana.

In addition, the Code of Conduct specifies that if you are taking prescription medications with the potential of impairing any functioning or judgment, you will not engage in activities that would put Scouts at risk, including driving or operating equipment.

**Stoves and Lanterns:** Follow safe practices regarding fuel. No liquid fuels such as white gas is allowed. Propane use or charcoal cooking only. Keep open flames out of and away from tents.

**Trash:** Your trash must be taken to a dumpster. No trash should remain in campsites overnight. There are skunks and raccoons that will visit your site if food or trash is left out.

**Vehicles:** The health and safety committee along with the camping committee has established a written policy and procedure of vehicles in camp.

- Vehicles should remain in campsites once you arrive and not driven around the camp
- 5 MPH (walking speed) speed limit
- Riding in truck beds is prohibited. RV's, ATV's, and golf carts are prohibited; Staff carts are permitted

- Tent

- Propane stove
- Utensils for cooking & eating
- Pot to heat water for clean-up
- Washbasins or similar for safe sanitation of cooking and eating utensils
- Cooler for keeping food safe
- First-aid kit
- Wagon (for moving gear)
- Recreational items (frisbee, fishing gear, bikes, etc.)

## Personal Items

- Sleeping bag
- Pillow
- Water bottle
- Sturdy closed-toed shoes
- Rain jacket
- Sweatshirt or jacket
- Clothes
- Swimsuit
- Towel
- Washcloth
- Toothbrush & paste
- Hand soap
- Hand sanitizer
- Shampoo
- Brush/comb
- Sunscreen
- Insect repellent
- Flashlight

## What NOT to Bring

- Alcohol or illegal drugs
- Firearms (including archery equipment)
- Roller blades or skates
- Skateboards
- Sheath knives
- Fireworks
